Autism Acceptance Month

"If you've met one individual with autism, you've met one individual with autism."

Last year, the Autism Society of America announced that the old reference of "Autism Awareness Month" was being retired for the new terminology "Autism Acceptance Month," in order to reflect the continuing efforts of fostering acceptance in all aspects of society that a person with autism interfaces with. A tremendous amount of work has been done by advocacy groups which include members of the Ethiopian and Eritrean communities both locally and nationally in spreading awareness of the condition, advancing research and creating policies that serve the needs of the autism community.

ECMAA is immensely proud of the awareness and advocacy work that continues to be done by its members and the past autism-focused events we have hosted which include workshops on what autism is, debunking myths, information on how to obtain and navigate resources for a person with autism and fundraising walks to support the NIA Foundation Ethiopia. As an organization, we are committed to continuing this dialogue and supporting work that aims to have people with autism live fully.

What is Autism?

Formally known as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), autism is a developmental condition that typically appears during early childhood and can impact a person's social skills, communication, relationships, and self-regulation. Autism is defined by a certain set of behaviors and is often referred to as a "spectrum condition" that affects people **differently** and to varying degrees. The importance of early detection and being connected with early intervention services cannot be stressed enough. These services include different forms of therapies that have shown to result in significant developmental gain and symptom reduction; it's never too late to obtain services (even in adulthood). These treatments are offered **FREE** through a federal program called the Early Intervention Program and include services like speech, occupational and Applied Behavioral Analysis (ABA) therapies. The process to access these services may be different in each state and local autism advocacy groups are there to assist a person navigate this process.
